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Who is Judith Butler?



- American academic with theories of the performative nature of sex and gender
- Theories were influential within Francocentric philosophy, cultural theory, queer theory, and some schools of philosophical feminism from the late 20th century

Butler's books

- Butler's first book, *Subjects of Desire: Hegelian Reflections in Twentieth-Century France (1987),* was a discussion of the concept of desire
- Her best-known work, *Gender trouble: Feminism and the Subversion of Identity (1990),* and its sequel, *Bodies That Matter: On the Discursive Limits of 'Sex'(1993)*, Butler built upon the familiar cultural-theoretic assumption that gender is a social construct
- Butler's *Gender Trouble* was one of the founding texts of queer theory

Butler's main arguments and concerns

- Butler's work continued to inform much debate within the cultural theory, in the United States, in the early 21st century.
- In *Gender Trouble,* Butler questioned the validity of much feminist political theorizing by suggesting that the subject whose oppression those theories attempted to explain- "women" is an exclusionary construct.
- She doubted the wisdom of conventional political activism aimed at protecting women's rights and interests.
- Butler emphasized the subversive destabilization of "women" and other categories through consciously deviant gendered behaviour
